KUBB

Kubb is a Swedish lawn game made of wood (with roots suggested in Gotland, Sweden more than 1,000 years ago) using batons (kastspinnar) thrown to knock down wooden kubbs or blocks (vedkubbar) on an opponent's side of the field. Ultimately, the goal is to be able to knock down the king after knocking down all the kubbs on that opposite side. Games can last a very short time (an inadvertent knocking down of the king – much like getting the 8-ball in prematurely in a game of pool) to perhaps as long as two hours. While its roots claim to be more than 1,000 years old, it was reportedly invented by Alton Kuse in the early 1900s.

Kubb is a game of strategy, coupled with a bit of a sharp eye and good hand coordination, and has been likened to a combination of bowling and horseshoes but with a bit of chess built in. Best played on grass, the "pitch" or Kubb field, is approximately 24' x 16' with Kubbs initially lined up on either end, and the king is in the center of the pitch.

There are two teams playing the game, and consisting of as few as one and as many as six individuals, who alternate throws to achieve the right to attempt to knock the king down for the win.

Each year, several hundred individuals participate in competition in Eau Claire, WI, and then many more vie for the national prize at Gotland in later July and early August. Several individuals from the Chisago Lakes area have attended, competed, and/or won in the events at both locations.

Kubb sets are readily available in game stores, or through on-line sources, mostly being made out of pine (regulation for the game). The game can be played by individuals of all ages, though when children play, the length of the pitch is usually adjusted.

Karl Oskar Hus/Nya Duvemåla (Chapter 1)

I have the intention to write some about the Karl Oskar House and it's history in each issue of the newsletter in the future. This is the first entry.

1825, 11/18 Carl Jonasson/Linn was born as well as his twin sister, Kajsa

1852, 08/?? Carl Linn sails from Gothenburg on Abrosius

1852, 08/03? Carl Linn arrives in New York

1853, Spring Carl Linn files for homestead on a property between Linn Lake and Kroon Lake and builds a log cabin there.

1854 Carl Linn married Lena Kajsa Falk

1855, 02/14 Carl and Lena Kajsa's daughter Maria Charlotta was born.

1857, 03/12 Carl and Lena Kajsa's son J. William was born.

1858, 10/01 Carl and Lena Kajsa's son Lot Albert was born.

1861, 04/23 Carl and Lena Kajsa's son Jonas Oscar was born.

1862, Carl Linn built the regular house, which today is the Karl Oskar House

1863, 04/11 Carl and Lena Kajsa's daughter Olivia Vilhelmina was born.

1865, 10/30 Carl and Lena Kajsa's son Joseph Willhelm was born.

1868, 01/31 Carl and Lena Kajsa's son Luther Edwin was born.

1872, 06/30 Carl and Lena Kajsa's son Otto Christian was born.

1912, ??/?? Oscar Linn, son of Carl Linn takes over property after Carl died.

1914, ??/?? Charles G Johansson, married Dora Linn (Niece to Carl Linn) rented the property and farmed there.

1919, ??/?? Charles G Johansson and Dora moved to Cushing, WI.

?? The property was bought by Gerald and Urban Holt

1948 Swedish author Vilhelm Moberg visited the Chisago Lakes Area while researching his acclaimed book series: The Emigrants, Unto a Good Land, The Settlers and Last Letter Home. He then saw this house and said: "In that house shall Karl Oskar die".

1995 The Gerald and Urban Holt families donated the house to Chisago County. (Today the organization Friends of the Karl Oskar House maintains the houses at Nya Duvemåla)

Carl and Lena Kajsa Linn are buried at Glader Cemetary across the road and a block east from Nya Duvemåla.
